Keynote speakers include Dr David Abernethy (Consultant Neurologist NZ), Assoc Professor Anne LeFlamme (Immunologist, Victoria University of Wellington NZ), Dr Debbie Mason (Consultant Neurologist, NZ), Dr Glenda Wallace (Clinical Psychologist, NZ), Louise Rath (Clinical Nurse Specialist, Aust.) and Hiranthi Abeygooneskera (Chief Legal Counsel, CCDHD, NZ).

The conference is also a marvellous opportunity to network and share antipodean experience in caring for people with MS. While many aspects are the same, the New Zealand nurse specialists will be looking to learn about the therapy experiences of the newer products to New Zealand shores.
